Suzie Q. Weiss President Unit 32 I find it hard to explain to others just how great an honor it was to serve as The American Legion National Commander. First, I need to explain my own background. I was raised in a small farming community of 450 people and attended DeLand Weldon High school, a graduating class of 28. Enlisted in the Illinois Army National Guard. I served in the guard and active duty a total of 26 years before retiring.

It took six years once Illinois selected me to be their candidate to run for National Commander for me to achieve the office. I chaired three National Committees, spent 2 years traveling to every state campaigning for the office. Trying to learn how The American Legion operates state by state. Every state has different programs that are most important to them. We all work membership and support for our veterans and their families, but each state has different approaches to that mission.

As I traveled, I was inspired by the great things our American Legion family did in their own communities. Helping the homeless veterans, scholarships, baseball programs, Boys and Girls State programs where just a few of the ways The American Legion family served their communities. It was heartwarming to see just how caring and generous our members were with their time and money helping each other and their communities.

One of my most cherished memories is attending a ceremony conducted by Native American Veterans at Mt Rushmore and getting to be part of that event.

Serving our troops Thanksgiving meals in Korea helped remind me why the Legion family works year-round to support our Active-duty personnel.

The travel was hard, I spent 7 nights at home during the year I served as National Commander. I visited every state and traveled to the far east and Europe. Everywhere we traveled touching our active-duty men and women was a key to explaining The American Legion's mission.

Having the opportunity to represent this great organization when testifying about veterans' issues before congress was exciting and challenging. To play a key leadership role, being the spokesman for The American Legion, was an honor that I will never forget.

Again, coming from a small-town background to serve as National Commander of The American Legion was a great experience. I can't "Thank" the Illinois Legion family enough for giving me the honor of serving as National Commander.

The 90th Annual National American Legion Pilgrimage to the Tomb of Abraham Lincoln

Another Successful Pilgrimage to Mr. Lincoln's Tomb

The 90th Annual Lincoln Pilgrimage was a smashing success. Sixteen American Legion Departments were invited. Of those 13, including Illinois, sent delegations of varying size and composition. Those sending delegations included: Arkansas, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Minnesota, Michigan, Missouri, Nebraska, Ohio, Oklahoma, and Wisconsin.

Chef de Chemin de Fer Frank Campo, a Post 32 Legionnaire, of the National 40 and 8 attended. National Director Georgiann Callaway of the National Honor Society of Women Legionnaires attended. Though unable to attend, LaChapeau Nationale Linda Diebel was represented by L'Aumonier Nationale Luella Buske.

Within the American Legion Family, Daniel J. Seehafer, National Commander the American Legion and Donald Hall, jr., National Commander of The Sons of The American Legion attended and participated fully in the ceremonies. Though Lisa Williamson, National President of The American Legion Auxiliary was unable to attend, she was represented by PNP and Special Envoy, Sharon Conatser. PNC Denise Rohan was also in attendance.

Mayor Buscher attended, placed a wreath, and spoke at the Tomb. She also gave words of welcome during Breakfast and the Lincoln Commemoration Luncheon.

Other dignitaries taking part in the Tomb Ceremony include Illinois State Senators Doris Turner and Steve McClure, and Illinois State Representative Mike Coffey.

We scored some impressive numbers this year.
There were 211 individuals at the Breakfast and 220 individuals at the Lincoln Commemoration Luncheon.
There was a total of 143 nights reserved at the President Abraham Lincoln Hotel.

The impact of the Pilgrimage on Springfield's economy is impressive. 211 breakfasts times \$30.00 each equal \$6,330.00. 220 lunches times \$35 each equal \$7,700.00. 143 nights at the hotel times \$112.00 equals \$16,016.00. Adding the 3 together equals \$30,046. Not included is money spent at the Post 32 Open House held every year the night before the formal ceremonies of The Pilgrimage.

It Has Been an Honor Bob Wesley

It has been my honor to hold the position of General Chairman of the Post 32 Lincoln Pilgrimage Committee for the past five years. I have decided to relinquish that honor following the 90th Annual Pilgrimage. It is significant to note that in the 90-year history of the Pilgrimage, there have been only 5 Post 32 Legionnaires to hold this position. In addition to my 5 years, (2020 – 2024), Herbert Tragethon and Noel C. Moore served a total of 43 years (1935 – 1978), Mike Walton served 35 years (1978 – 2013), and Tony Libri served 7 years (2013 – 2019).In 2025, Jim Peters, Commander of The Sons of The American Legion Squadron 32 will assume the position of General Chairman.

The Lincoln Pilgrimage is THE Post 32 legacy, and we are justly proud of it. The members of the Post 32 Lincoln Pilgrimage Committee are the ones who make it a huge success thus maintaining the legacy.

Unit 32 member, Penny Lee, prepared 26 of the wreaths placed during the Ceremony at Mr. Lincoln's Tomb. Director Mike Lee and the Post 32 Riders delivered the wreaths to the Tomb the evening before the ceremony and retrieved the wreaths immediately following the Tomb Ceremony. The Riders also organized the vehicles taking part in the Pilgrimage to the Tomb. Unit 32 member, Ethellynn Neville and Post 32 members Barb Lush and Phil Drum organized meal tickets and provided them to attendees during the Breakfast and the Lincoln Commemoration Luncheon. Legionnaires Jerry Bellatti, Dave Cooper and Bruce O'Neil and Squadron 32 member Jim Peters organized activities during the Tomb Ceremony. All serve as volunteers. Thank you for making my time as General Chairman a success.

Honor, History and Humor at Camp Butler National Cemetery

Camp Butler National Cemetery (CBNC) is hallowed ground. It is the final resting place for tens of thousands of deserving veterans and members of their immediate family. Members of the Inter-Veterans Burial Detail of Sangamon County (The Detail) consider it an honor and privilege to provide military honors, with or without the Department of Defense, for these veterans and their families. In 2022, The Detail provided military honors at 339 funerals, averaging almost seven per week. Approximately 294 (87%) were at CBNC.

Members of The Detail take the opportunity between funerals to honor and remember their family members buried at CBNC by visiting their final resting place. They also honor veterans with whom they served on The Detail, those with significant achievements and those with unique information on their headstones. Every veteran deserves honor and remembrance for their service.

One site of significant achievement is that of a Springfield native Medal of Honor Recipient. On July 26th, three members of American Legion Post 32, Springfield, Illinois, honored Medal of Honor recipient John Catherwood at his grave site. They are David Janssen, Bill Settles and David Cooper. According to Wikipedia, John Hugh Catherwood (1888 – 1930), was a United States Navy Ordinary Seaman (OS), born in Springfield. He ". . . received the Medal of Honor for actions during the Moro Rebellion aboard USS Pampanga (PG-39). Seaman Catherwood was critically wounded during action on September 24, 1911." Visitors can honor their relatives and secure their personal history. Visitors to the cemetery can locate the grave of family members by accessing the "Grave Locator" terminal located outside the cemetery office and/or online at http://www.cem.va.gov/cems/nchp/campbutler.asp.

CBNC has its history documented online and on plaques, monuments, and memorials throughout the cemetery. The CBNC website lists a memorial carillon that the American Veterans (AMVETS) donated around 1970. The website also list the Blue Star Memorial installed May 19. 2006, and the Korean War Memorial installed May 23, 2006. A monument honoring the Illinois LST sailors was erected in May 2006. Several plagues and informative signs are displayed on walkways throughout the cemetery. CBNC was selected in 1861 as a Union army training site. State Treasurer William Butler assisted General Tecumseh Sherman in acquiring the site. "General Sherman was pleased with the site and named it CBNC to honor his companion." CBNC was a prison after the capture of Fort Donelson, Tennessee. 2,000 Confederates were held there. Primitive facilities, harsh winters and summers, diseases and epidemics decimated the prisoner population. 700 POWs died in the 1862 smallpox epidemic. They are buried in a special section of CBNC.

The National Cemetery Administration (NCA) permits next of kin the opportunity to personalize the headstone the NCA provides with as many as four lines in addition to the record of service of the veteran. Sam Montalbano was a conscientious member of The Detail and served at every funeral for over 20 years. He had a great sense of humor. He always had a joke to share and always requested fellow Detail members to share jokes with him that he could tell at the Little Flower Catholic Church Mens' Club. His humor is reflected in the lines that he requested that are forever chiseled in stone.
